Today I would like to introduce **HOME**, a project curated by a good friend and amazing artist, Wai Kit Lam.

First of all, I would like to introduce **Wai Kit Lam**. Kit is an old friend. We met for the first time in 2009 in Berlin, during an artist residency, and since then we have worked together on many projects. I would like to take this opportunity to thank her for all the opportunities over the years.

Kit is from Hong Kong. She is a brilliant artist and curator, and she recently moved to London. I will talk more about her soon, but if you are curious, you can visit her **website**.

The project I am talking about, *HOME*, brings together 25 international artists around the idea of home and a small pillar measuring 115 (H) × 25 (W) × 25 (D) cm.

From March 9th to September 24th, each artist will explore what home means.

Home encompasses multiple meanings for each of us.

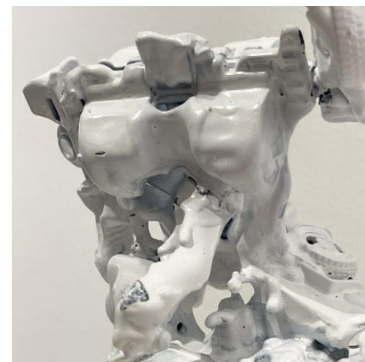

In *I am landscape* (2026), Hundrich reflects on self-projection and belonging. Displaced from the forest and repositioned on a man-made pillar, the pine branch is no longer a mere fragment of nature, but a carrier of the artist's history, soul, and essence, transforming anywhere it exists into a space called home.
